strategy by a group of frustrated taxpayers?
The Oakland County Taxpayers Association has
duced a new offensive for the 1990 campaign. -introVCR, the initials stand for "vote, cut and remove." OCTA is callingfornothinglessthantheremovaloftheentireMichi-
gan legislature this year.
In its latest press release, the group compares the legisature to a 44cancer" in Lansing, and recommends "direct surgery" by removing the senators and representatives.
"What we have found is there is a problem but nobody seems to know the solution," said the group's public rela ions leader, Stanley Lechert, of Oxford Township. The group is active in Oxford, Orion, Addison, Oakland, Branon and Independence townships.

Lechert said voter apathy has allowed the status quo to continue in Michigan. To help counteract that, he recommends filing for absentee ballots as a way to get more voters to the polls.
"It seems to me the easiest way to get people to vote is to make it easy for them," he said. "My approach is to mail
t agressi'tl
them the absentee ballot, if they're registered, and chances
are you'll get it back."
Lechert
said OCTA now boasts some 400-1 members, though it hasn't always been easy to mus support as it makes it's way around the townships.

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The recent decision of Judge Marvin Stempien on the city utility tax provides an important opportunity to review the state's policy in this area. The legislature regularly includes "sunset" or expiration dates in legislation. This is a valid practice because there are certain wwsorpoliceswhicharebestsuitedforonlyashort time awsorpoliceswhicharebestsuitedforonlyashort
or which warrant future review.
Tax increases in particular are government polices
which should be made cautiously and for the shortest time possible. The legislature in 1970 recognized this and stipulated that the utility tax would expire in 1972. The expiration was pushed back five separate times with the final expiration date being June 30, l@988

However, as the case made clear, collected even after the last expiration date because of anattorney General opinion that the legislation drafting the final expiration date was flawed. Now, Judge Stempien has essentially stated that the legislature intended for this tax to end despite the precise language in the legislation.

Since this tax was collected for several months without legal authorization, that revenue really belongs to those who paid it. At this point, there is discussion of an injunction to allow the collections @ o continue. There is also the matter of whether or not the tax should be revived through action at the state level. These are valid questions.

Thereisnoquestiontbat theutilitytaxhasprovided a very large amount of revenue to the City of Detroit for many years

There is also no question that specific policy deci sions by the city have diverted scarce funds to questionable programs and undermined voter confidence. The Chrysler-Jefferson project the expansion of Detroit City Airport, the ownership of the cityjet, the ongoing subsidy the Downtown People Mover and the various complaints about smaller expei-ises have done much to damage the credibility of the city's stewardship.

Detroit's citizens, like citizens everywhere, want
and need a few basic services most. The assurance that a policeman stands guard or that an ambulance will soon arrive is at the heart of a government's responsibility

Taxes are a payment from citizens for the provision of those and other services

Any move to reinstate the utility tax-either by
 Government properly levies a tax when ment to reinstate the utility tax must be accompanied by the recognition and requirement that it will only be used for essential services.

The statute which provided for the utility tax stipu-
lated that the majority of the tax must fund police officers. Any proposal for reinstating this tax without at officers. Any proposal for reinstating this tax

Additionally, the sudden loss of of hand. potential Addionally, the sudden loss of this tax, and the potential shortfall in revenue raises ever louder the call for a responsible use of tax revenue in the Cityof Detroit, until a commitment to sound fiscal management is then should be considered made. Even simply assuring that money will go for "police" has not prevented abuses and these must end.

Finally, over the past several years there has often been the attitude in Michigan chat the problems of Detroit were only Detroit's. Now, the rest of us need to realizeourroleiiirevit@ilizingtliiscity.At tliesametime, when Detroit asks for state action, it must offer something in return. rlllie new City Council has made encoiiraging statem ents about fiscal reform. These policies and hold action must accompany any revision of this tax.
